Board Members volunteer their time and talents to keep the Association going. We have Board Member opportunities coming up for 2017 Board at the June 25th Annual Meeting.



### Michigan DNR is planning to clear cut 90 - 97% of the seven acre parcel at the Northwest corner of Ann Lake

One of our ALPOA members noticed logging on Mud Lake across Lake Ann Road and called the DNR. A DNR forestry officer called back. The officer mentioned that more cutting is planned near the camp ground, next to the other clear cutting off of Reynolds Road. Around 90 % of the trees are Aspen (or Poplars) and are about 50 years old so the DNR plans to +clear cut with retention+. This means that they will keep clumps of trees including oak and maple. Retention will be 3-10% of the trees.



The time for public input has passed. The plan was presented at a public open house on July 28, 2015 and approved at the DNR compartment review meeting on August 24, 2015.

Adjacent property owners were never informed of the plans. The DNR claimed to have notified Almira Township. Mark Roper, Twp Supervisor was unaware of this project. The DNR has no idea where the property lines are and policy allows them to clear cut to the line. There is concern as to the fragile wetland in this area and the wildlife that call it home. There are two streams that feed Ann Lake from this area. Yellow Birch is becoming more rare. There are Yellow Birch in the wetland and the endangered Massasauga Rattlesnake. Consideration as to wind damage in these sandy soils as to the remaining % lumps of trees+ was obviously overlooked. A larger Oak was blown down in a micro-burst in this area, even with a supporting tree canopy.

The States properties on Ann Lake make this a concern of the Ann Lake Property Owners Association. The DNR made no effort to contact an ALPOA Board member and will not reopen public comment.

# **Invasive Species Committee** Year-end Report for 2015

The Invasive Species Committee of Ann Lake Property Owners Association (ALPOA) undertook a mapping of the aquatic plants within Ann Lake on August 11<sup>th</sup>. This was a follow on to previous mappings of 2012 and 2013. The goal was to answer these questions:

- Are there any new plants to be found in our lake?
- How did the densities compare to the results of previous years?
- Was there any plant species found that are non-native and hence invasive?

This year we again decided to change the format slightly from the MLSA (Michigan Lakes and Streams Association), guidelines, this due to the sharpness of our drop offs and the absence of flora at 1 foot depths around the lake. Since we have never found anything of significance at 1 foot, and it is hard to get the pontoon boat consistently held at 1 foot, we have decided to forego this sampling. In addition, since we only had 2 sampling rakes, we decided to only sample to the left and right of the pontoon. This allowed us to form 2 fastworking identification teams. The team members consisted of Kathy Taylor and Sven Anderson (substituting for Maggie Sowers) on one side with Drew Peterson and Bethany Onthank on the other side. Kent Taylor provided and drove the pontoon boat. Dianne Minicucci served as scribe. The whole process took a little over 3 hours as we now do it.

Since we only did 2 samplings at the 4 and 8 foot levels, rather than the 4 suggested by the MLSA procedure, in 2013 we changed how the density factor was determined






correspond with our slightly abbreviated process. This change is described in detail on the complete report located on our website (link to follow). This process can be changed back again if statistically it makes sense to go back to the method recommended by MLSA. However, we think this density measurement process customized, by our committee, is more logical for this lake and should be maintained going into the future. Because of that, the trend (comparison) charts comparing 2013 to 2015 are the most relevant since they were created using identical protocols.

In 2012 we found 17 different plant species. In 2013 we found 12; those missing were clasping leaf pondweed, coon tail, sago pondweed, water marigold, and white stem pondweed. In 2015 we once again found clasping leaf and sago pondweeds, but again, no coon tail, water marigold or white stem pond weed.

This year we found 3 plants we had difficulty identifying. At first we thought one was curly-leaf pondweed but it turned out to be clasping leaf pondweed (good news!). The second plant we didnot initially identify but found later that this was Illinois pondweed, again good news. The third plant we still have not identified. It looks like algae entangled with some leafy plants. This third plant, shown to the right, is not reflected in any of the tables. Experts at MSU to whom we sent pictures, told us not to be concerned with what to them appeared to be a benign form of algae.





For your information, charts have been completed for each of these transects, comparing plants found year to year. These variants demonstrate the randomness of any sampling survey. That we once again found two plants species this year (clasping leaf and sago pondweeds) that were first found in 2012 but not in 2013, serves to support the process weave adopted and the need to do this regularly to minimize randomness. What our complete report (found online) provides is a series of charts summarizing all of the work noted above. These tables show plant types and densities at all transects and all sampling depths. They are organized both by plant type and locations (the 17 transect points). We feel that for most of our members the summary chart found at the end of this article is the most useful.

#### Conclusion


The Committee stands behind the work done in generating the data and creating this report. Based on the data found this year as well as two previous years, we feel this year project should be viewed as having a very positive outcome. As a result of these activities we can now confidently state that currently our lake is in very good shape, with relatively stable plant populations. The committee has not yet made a final recommendation on how often this mapping should be done but based on what we finding and not finding, the past two committee chairmen believe this task should be done at least every other year.

Committee members deserve thanks for the hard dirty work they do on the behalf of the Association. The committee would also like to thank Sven Anderson for filling in that day. In our opinion the most important chart is the first one, the year to year plant comparison chart. ### Year to Year Plant Comparison



We feel the above chart is the most valuable in our series. At a glance it illustrates trends seen lake-wide by plant species over the past 3 years of sampling (2012, 2013, and 2015). One can quickly gain a visual impression of the changing densities we found by species in Ann Lake. Since the first sampling, no new plants have been found. If a plant is gaining an increasing or decreasing foothold, the trend can be seen quickly without diving too far into the data. 
## Water Quality Report Phosphorous on Ann Lake

Phosphorus is a common constituent of fertilizer use, pet wastes, storm water runoff, septic system effluents, waterfowl, and agriculture. It is an essential element for plant life, but when there is too much of it in water, it can speed up eutrophication (a reduction in dissolved oxygen in water bodies caused by an increase of mineral and organic nutrients) of rivers and lakes.

Phosphorus tends to attach to soil particles and, thus, moves into surface-water bodies from runoff. As phosphorus levels increase, the amount of algae increases too. At very high levels of phosphorus, other nutrients or light may limit the growth of algae. Long-term management of excessive algae requires the removal of phosphorus sources to the water body. Reducing phosphorus inputs to lakes can affect the amount of algae in the lake by removing a key nutrient.

While the CLMP report for 2015 has not yet been completed (it will be posted on the <u>Water Quality web page</u> once it is available), past reports indicate the phosphorus has been increasing in Ann Lake these last 16 years. Ann Lake is still doing well relative to algae and transparency. Please monitor your properties by:

- 1. Dong use lawn fertilizers.
- 2. Pick up after your pets near the lakeshore.
- 3. Monitor your septic system to be sure ites in good working order.
- 4. Use no or low phosphate laundry detergents.
- 5. Monitor runoff from your property. No soil erosion near the lakeshore.




# Membership Report

Our membership goals are two-fold, retain existing members while trying to expand our overall membership. In 2014 we had 88 members, a 10% improvement over the last year. In 2015 we gave up some of that gain as membership shrunk slightly to 83 members. As such, even last years number puts us at 40% membership out of 206 land parcels on the lake, a fairly good ratio as lake associations go. Yet we strive for more, not so much for the money but rather to ensure that all opinions and issues of our riparian community are represented in our association. We gained 7 new members this past year though we lost 12. Pursuing the reasons for that drop-off in old members is something we will aggressively pursue this year, to ensure we only lose members who move off the lake and not members who have become disaffected. We realize that increasing membership requires both hard work on the part of the Board and Volunteers planning events and getting the word out but by also continually making membership more meaningful. Those results are found below and throughout this newsletter. In Membership it all starts with communication. Spearheading that the past two years, Bethany Onthank marshaled the resources of many other board members in:

- Designing a post card reminder system to economically and repeatedly, if needed, encourage prompt dues payments.
- Appling more data tracking to encourage earlier dues payment and target nonmembers who have yet to join or whose memberships have lapsed.
- Responding to the clamor for more group events by adding the Summer Swan Song Soiree and October Pub Crawl, events costing the Association nothing to create and organize.
- Taking an even more pro-active role in local government issues to make sure our lake residentsgopinions are heard.
- Creating new membership forms that provide us with much needed information on our membersqpreferred addresses, emails and other important details. Note: many still merely send us a check without including this form, so please download and use this form to make our work and member contact easier.

To budget and plan appropriately we need to receive your dues payment as soon after the New Year as possible. Here a chart illustrating this and other membership trends:



As to the Boards efforts to control costs incurred in providing free membership subscriptions of *The Riparian*: This Michigan-centric magazine, though very informative on lake ownership and shoreline management issues, remains an increasingly expensive membership perk (\$12/yr.) wedge provided to members over the past several years. Even with our group discount, it remains a very large a portion of membership dues. So in 2011 we added a check box to the membership form (another reason to use this form) to ensure we paid for only those members who wanted and presumably read the magazine. This knocked off only a few uninterested subscribers and it remains a considerable expense. To encourage both earlier renewals and the continued circulation of this valued magazine, while still keeping an eye on costs, late last year the Board voted to offer a 50% discount (\$6) on our cost of subscriptions to those who paid by March 1st. Late-payers can always subscribe directly to the magazine at its standard rate of \$14/yr. This program will be in full effect next year since our renewals are a year in advance and new forms had to be created. Any comments on this evolving policy are gladly accepted.

I will be assisting with membership this year and will need committee members to help. If you can help, please let me know. Let all have another great year working on the issues that tie us together, maintaining a beautiful Ann Lake and having some fun.


