Notes from the President

GUEST SPEAKER FOR ANNUAL MEETING, JUNE 30

Friends.

The annual meeting of members will be June 30, at noon, in the old town hall in the village. Impleased to announce that we have a special guest speaker for the meeting this year, who will be discussing a timely subject which should be of interest to all lake property owners. Bear with me.

Elsewhere in this newsletter there is a report from the Invasive Species Committee. Briefly, for the past couple years the primary focus of that committee has been on the risk of invasive aquatic vegetation, especially Eurasian Watermilfoil (EWM). Once EWM is introduced to a lake, it spreads rapidly and will literally fill areas of the lake with vegetation to the point that navigation is virtually impossible. EWM has been found as nearby as Green Lake, Interlochen. Remediation is expensive! Early detection is prudent, and effective in minimizing the cost.

Your ALPOA Board is pleased that Almira Township officials have recognized the threat of EWM to property values, and agreed to collaborate with residents of both Ann and Pearl Lakes, to engage professionals to monitor and detect such invasives, and promptly remediate if/when detected.

THE MEETING WILL AFFORD ALL PROPERTY OWNERS AN OPPORTUNITY TO LEARN MORE ABOUT THIS RISK, AND THE PLAN. The guest speaker will be BreAnne Grabill, Environmental Scientist, with PLM Lake and Land Management. Township Trustee, Matt Therrien will also be present, to represent the townships perspective and interest in the issue. There will be opportunity for Q&A.

Please join us for lunch. Pulled pork sandwiches and tableware will be provided. Bring a dish to pass. And you've welcome even if you haven've already paid dues. We hope you've appreciate the benefit of these efforts, to all property owners, and perhaps consider becoming a member.


On May 15, we launched the artificial nesting platform and positioned the buoys. The loons showed up on and off again for the next week, but we were concerned that the nest was sitting low in the water and that it looked like it had taken on water. On the 23rd, we added some floatation devices. On the 25th, the loons began their nesting. If all goes well, we should have chicks by the end of June. This would be 2 weeks later than last year. Invasive Species Report Submitted by Kent Taylor

We have accomplished a great deal this past year. We we kept our focus on monitoring the lake, educating the public on invasive threats while planning for a future infestation of an aquatic plant and all the activity and funding that might entail. Nearby lakes such as Duck Lake, Long Lake, Crystal Lake, Herring Lakes and Little Platte are all facing infestations of Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM); will we be next? Not if we can help it!! So here what we we been doing to prevent and prepare for this and other invasive threats to our lake:

- Monitoring: Our annual lake survey conducted by this committee has once again revealed no known invasive plant in has been found in Ann Lake as of last year.
- <u>Funding</u>: Last years fundraiser successfully met its goal, generating \$5000 to combine with existing reserves. We now have sequestered a \$10,000 invasive species reserve dedicated to addressing any future, first year weed remediation efforts we may require.
- Educational Outreach: We facilitated the distribution of information throughout the township on the dangers of transporting invasive weeds in small fragments hidden in boats and trailers. This effort stretched from demonstrations at the Lake Ann Homecoming (which we plan on doing again this year), to this year meeting with boat sellers to attach informational stickers to rental and new boat trailers. The township embraced our idea and included flyers in each tax bill describing EWM and Garlic Mustard invasives. We encouraged and assisted the DNR in posting informational signage at the boat launch about % quatic hitchhikers.
- <u>Established Lake Partnerships</u> as we did this year with Pearl Lakeos Association. They will share in the benefits we ge negotiating while also providing a larger constituent voice as our unprecedented vision, a public/private partnership with the township takes shape.
- <u>Partnering with our Local Governments</u>: As you know, to address our long-term invasive threats we have been working with the township in an effort to share the risk township-wide. In this area that we have seen some remarkable developments.

At the township board meeting in December 2016 we presented our fears of infestation in a <u>slide show</u>. We stated a desire to develop a local government/lake association partnership to share the long-term mitigating these looming risks. In that presentation we requested the township establish a reserve fund similar to ours. This to be dedicated to assisting in any first-year treatments required in our township lakes before other funding mechanisms are created. We also asked for and have received support for:

- 1. Communication and educational outreach efforts within the lake community.
- 2. Selection of a lake management firm to serve the township before it is needed.
- 3. Consideration of how any needed future tax-supported efforts might be structured in preparation for the day they might be needed and quickly.

The township board has addressed these requests with demonstrable support. They have sent flyers on invasive plants with our tax bills at a cost to the township of hundreds to dollars. They cooperated with us this spring in the selection of a preferred lake vendor. And significantly, they created a proactive program to utilize this vendor, partially funding (50/50 up to \$2,000) annual lake surveys in Pearl and Ann Lakes by PLM Lake Management as proto-types for the township. For this additional monitoring, our associations will provide the other 50%, ALPOAcs from our operating budget not from our reserves. This new, shared arrangement puts lake management experts on our lake annually augmenting our survey with theirs done with more comprehensive methods and expertise. At a different time in the season we will continue to do our own yearly rake survey, providing double coverage and keeping our skills at weed I.D. sharp.

We thank all who supported our fundraiser and the efforts of this committee during the past year. We are proud of these accomplishments and vow to do everything possible to maintain the pristine nature of our lake. Please visit our booth during Lake Anno Homecoming to learn more



Non-Aquatic Invasive Plant Reminders

While ALPOA is not involved in managing terrestrial invasive plants, the newsletter provides an opportunity to remind people to check their property for invasive plants. One plant which seems to be prevalent in the area is garlic mustard. June is a prime month for pulling this invasive plant. Please seal these plants in garbage bags. This sealed bag can be placed in your garbage or there is a disposal site located in Frankfort. DO NOT PLACE IN YOUR COMPOST.





ALPOA Invasive Species Committee does an annual shoreline survey looking for invasive marsh plants. The two common ones in our area are Purple Loosestrife and Non-native Phragmites. We have not found any Non-native Phragmites but have found purple loosestrife along the shoreline. We let the riparian know that they have an invasive plant along their shoreline which, when found early, can easily be pulled. These plants should be pulled in June before going to seed. Please check your shoreline and remove any of these plants you find.

WATER QUALITY REPORT

Dave Maxson - Water Quality Monitor

Following is one page of the 2017 summary report from CLMP. (the complete report can be found on line under Water Quality). Following are my observations regarding each of the tests that are conducted each year. We've registered to continue the same monitoring for 2018, and have commenced.

Secchi Disk Transparency measures the clarity of the water. Measurements are recorded weekly from mid-May thru mid-September. You will see that the trend for our lake is very consistent and above average for all lakes in the program.

Chlorophyll samples are taken monthly from May through September. Again, you will see that the trend for our lake is very consistent, and below average for all lakes in the program.

Phosphorus samples are taken in early spring and late summer. The upward trend in this measurement has been somewhat worrisome for the past several years. However, there was a dramatic drop in both spring and fall 2017. I can only speculate as to what might be the cause for the improvement, but I know of one lakefront residence that was obliged to relocate its septic and drainfield in 2016. Coincidence?

Dissolved oxygen and temperature measurements are recorded 8 times between late May and early September.

Summary (in the lower right corner of the attached) concludes that our lake is Oligotrophic; i.e., generally deep and clear with little aquatic plant or algae growth. That a good thing!
