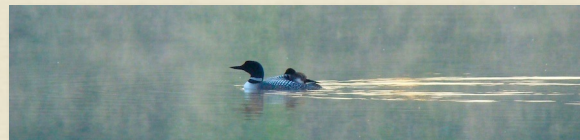

Ann Lake enjoys a native flora and fauna ecosystem. The only known aquatic invasive is the Zebra Mussel, which was introduced via the boat launch.

To maintain this pristine status we implore users to PLEASE:

- remove any/all mud, plants, fish/bait from your boat and trailer before entering or boating on this lake.
- utilize boat washes, where available, for boats and personal watercraft (PWC). Thoroughly wash smaller craft, ie., kayaks, canoes and paddle boards.
- drain water from all equipment and live wells before launching into any lake.
- do not release plants, fish, or live-bait into the lake unless they came out of the lake.
- do not dispose of fishing lines, nets, plastic, or other waste items in or near the lake.
- remember that campers may keep a boat on state land for the duration of their camping permit; however, overnight stays on a boat on the lake are not permitted.
- be courteous and respectful of private properties. If you want to anchor your boat to swim or party, please maintain a respectful distance from private homes.

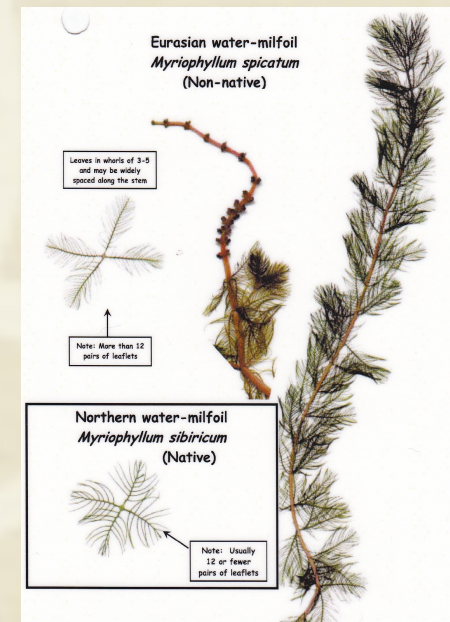
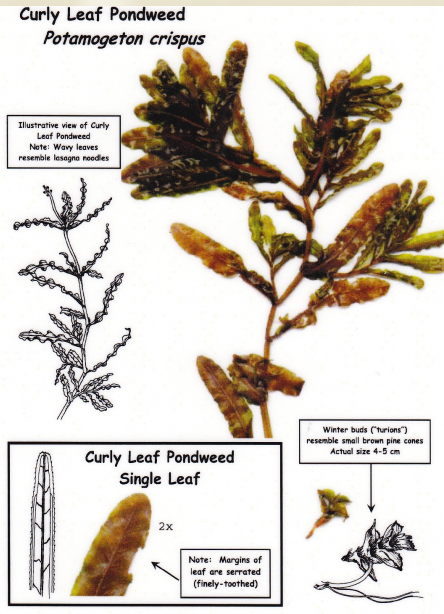


STOP AQUATIC HITCHHIKERS!

INVASIVE SPECIES Prevention is key!

ALPOA strives to prevent, monitor and control or eradicate both aquatic and land-based invasive species. Invasive species pose a threat to our lake. HELP keep our lake clean!

Please respect "passive" hours from 7:30 pm to 11 the following am. High-speed on-plane boating, such as water skiing, tubing, jet ski activities, and wake-boarding, is prohibited by state regulation between those times. At any/all times, please show courtesy to swimmers, lake fowl, fishermen, canoes, kayakers & other passive users of the lake.

Love our Loons, Give Them Room: Loons are threatened in Michigan and protected under state law; harassment is illegal. Ann Lake is home to a pair of nesting loons. Please take care and stay away from parents and young; young loons cannot dive or swim fast to avoid you. Be sure to retrieve all fishing line and tackle and use lead-free sinkers and jigs to reduce the risk of lead poisoning.

Slow, No Wake Areas, 3' or less. The lake depths vary from very shallow (see map) to as deep as 76 feet. Often the changes can be abrupt so watch out for propeller damage in the shallows. Wakes cause shoreline erosion, stir up bottom silt which in turn impacts water quality & harms fish breeding habitats.
